Message from Trustee Chair 2025-26



When most people join Rotary, they know little, if anything, about The Rotary Foundation. Membership Month is a great time to highlight the powerful connection between membership and our Foundation.

People who are drawn to Rotary care deeply about their communities and want to make a substantive difference. They're looking for meaningful, hands-on ways to serve — and the Foundation helps make those opportunities possible.

Cause-based Rotary clubs are one exciting way new members are finding purpose in Rotary, and these clubs also bring fresh energy and activity to our Foundation. I invited Marisol Chianello, president of one such club, to share her perspective:

"As a nonprofit attorney, I long believed I didn't have the time to be part of Rotary. But when I heard about a new cause-based e-club — the Rotary Club of Mental Health and Wellness District 5280 — I felt I had to be part of it.

In just three years, our club has done a lot to support mental health needs in Southern California and awarded thousands of dollars in scholarships to graduate students in the field, including one this year to a student in Uganda.

Just a few months ago, we were approved for our first global grant to provide a mix of in-person and digital mental wellness support to survivors of the 2023 earthquakes in southeastern Turkey. Through our service, we've attracted new members from across the United States, including women and younger members who might not have otherwise joined Rotary. Cause-based clubs like ours offer a meaningful entry point for people committed to a specific cause — backed by the global reach and Foundation support of Rotary."

Marisol's story reminds us what's possible when Rotary service meets Foundation support. I wonder how many cause-based club members knew the full extent of Foundation resources when they began. How many existing clubs could partner with these groups on grants?

As we build new Rotary and Rotaract clubs and welcome new members, let's keep The Rotary Foundation at the forefront. The Foundation enriches the membership experience, supports club growth, and deepens our impact.

The Rotary Foundation is more than just a source of funding; it is an invitation to endless opportunities. It's a living expression of who we are as Rotary.

The Foundation, too, can be a vital part of every member's experience when they join us or start a new club.

ROTARY CLUB OF BIAK NA BATO BRINGS SMILES WITH ANNUAL LIBRENG PUSTISO, LIBRENG NGITI PROJECT

QUEZON CITY, Philippines – The Rotary Club of Biak na Bato once again brought renewed confidence and brighter smiles to the residents of Bagumbayan, Quezon City, through its annual Libreng Pustiso, Libreng Ngiti (“Free Denture, Free Smile”) project. Spearheaded by Past President Freddie Ceballos, this year’s initiative—held on June 29, 2025, at the Bagumbayan Senior Citizens Hall—successfully provided free dentures to 100 beneficiaries.

The project, a cherished tradition of the Rotary Club of Biak na Bato, addresses a critical need for accessible dental care, particularly among senior citizens and low-income individuals who often lack the means for such essential services. The day-long event was carefully organized to ensure both efficiency and comfort for participants.

In the morning, patients underwent thorough dental assessments and fittings for their new dentures. The dedicated team of volunteer dentists and Rotary members worked diligently to ensure precise measurements and comfortable molds. Anticipation filled the room as beneficiaries looked forward to regaining not only their ability to chew properly but also their confidence to smile without hesitation.

By the afternoon, the hall was alive with joy and gratitude as the newly fitted dentures were distributed. The immediate transformation in the beneficiaries’ expressions was heartwarming, with many unable to contain their wide, beaming smiles. The project’s name, Libreng Ngiti (Free Smile), truly came to life as the space resonated with happy chatter and laughter.

Past President Freddie Ceballos expressed his profound satisfaction with the project’s continued success. “Seeing the genuine happiness and renewed confidence in the eyes of our beneficiaries is the greatest reward,” Ceballos said. “This project is more than just providing dentures—it’s about restoring dignity, improving quality of life, and spreading smiles throughout our community. 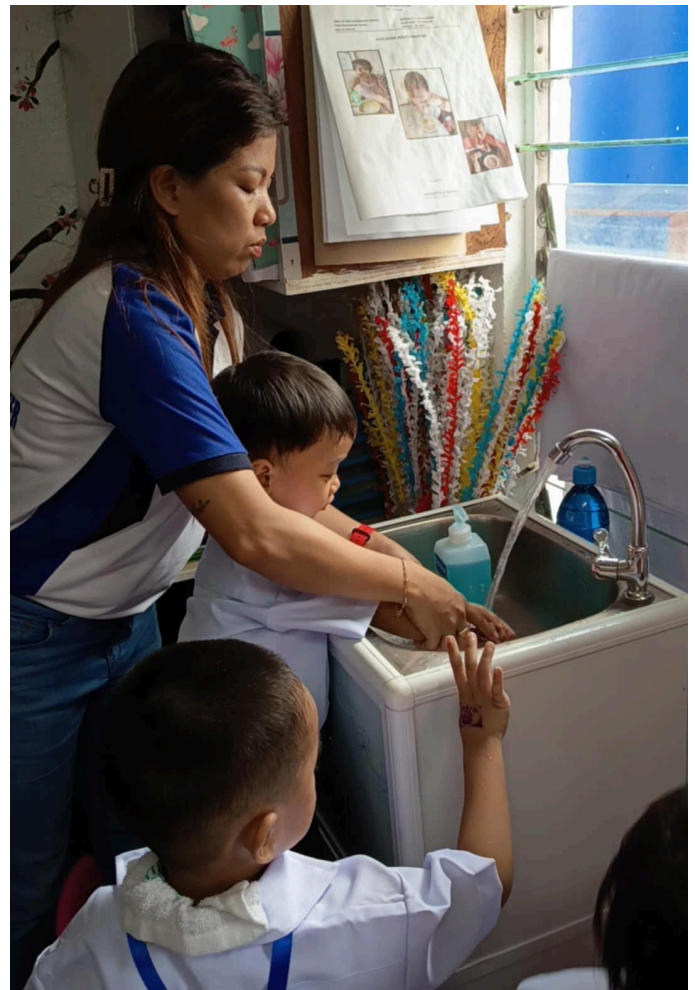

Meanwhile, the color printer empowers educators to produce vibrant and interactive learning materials, sparking interest and creativity among the children and reinforcing early literacy skills.

Beyond providing essential equipment, the project serves as a testament to the Rotary ideal of “Service Above Self.” It reflects the club’s goal of creating a safe, enriching, and healthy environment for early childhood development.

The warmth and appreciation expressed by the children, parents, and daycare staff proved that even modest efforts can leave a lasting impact. Thirteen clubs from Rotary International District (RID) 3780 Region 6 under Governor Veronica Yu, together with Rotarians of RID 3722 under Governor Kim Cheon Sik, gave polio vaccines, food, and school supplies to the children of Brgy. San Bartolome, Quezon City, last Saturday, July 5.

Around 150 children benefited from the project in two separate venues, ranging from infants and preschoolers to elementary school children. The local government of Brgy. San Bartolome, under P/B Rizza Pascual, assisted in the project.

Rotarians from RID 3722 also distributed toys, clothes, and additional supplies to the children and their families. Rotary clubs included in the service project were the Rotary Clubs of San Bartolome, Balintawak, Congressional, Cosmopolitan Timog, Greater Fairview, Mega Edsa, North Edsa, Quezon City APO, Quezon City Metro North Centennial, San Roque, Timog, University District Diliman, and VisMin.

The service project was part of the collaboration between RID 3780 and Korean Rotary Districts 3722 and 3590 at the beginning of Rotary Year 2025–2026.

Rotary's spirit of Service Above Self came alive on July 12, 2025, as Rotary District 3780 (Philippines) and District 3590 (South Korea) joined forces for a meaningful outreach project in Barangay Ramon Magsaysay, Quezon City. The event was spearheaded by District Governors Veronica Yu and Oh Deuk Yu, bringing together 11 local clubs under Region 2 of District 3780 and 85 UFG presidents from District 3590 in a remarkable display of global service and compassion.

Representing District 3780 Region 2 were the Rotary Clubs of Pearl of the Orient, Pag-asa, Banawe Chinatown, New Murphy, Midtown Diliman, Diliman Heights, Panay 18 QC, Heroes Hills, Diliman Central, Quezon City, and Diliman International. Together with their South Korean counterparts, they carried out a series of impactful initiatives that touched the lives of children, mothers, and families in the community.

The day's activities included polio vaccinations and boosters for over 80 children, reinforcing Rotary's long-standing commitment to end polio. A TB early detection program, led by Past President Dr. Virginia Irene Santos of RC Agham, further highlighted the focus on health care. To address immediate needs, a feeding program—organized in partnership with Rotaract Club of Cubao under UFG President Janine Yu—served hot meals, snacks, and clean water. In addition, families received food packs, hygiene kits, clothes, toys, and other essentials through a heartfelt gift-giving initiative.

This collaborative project addressed four of Rotary's key Areas of Focus: Disease Prevention and Treatment, Maternal and Child Health, Peacebuilding and Conflict Prevention, and Community Economic Development. More than just a service activity, the event became a celebration of unity, cultural exchange, and hope—reminding all that when communities come together, they can truly Unite for Good to End Polio Now.

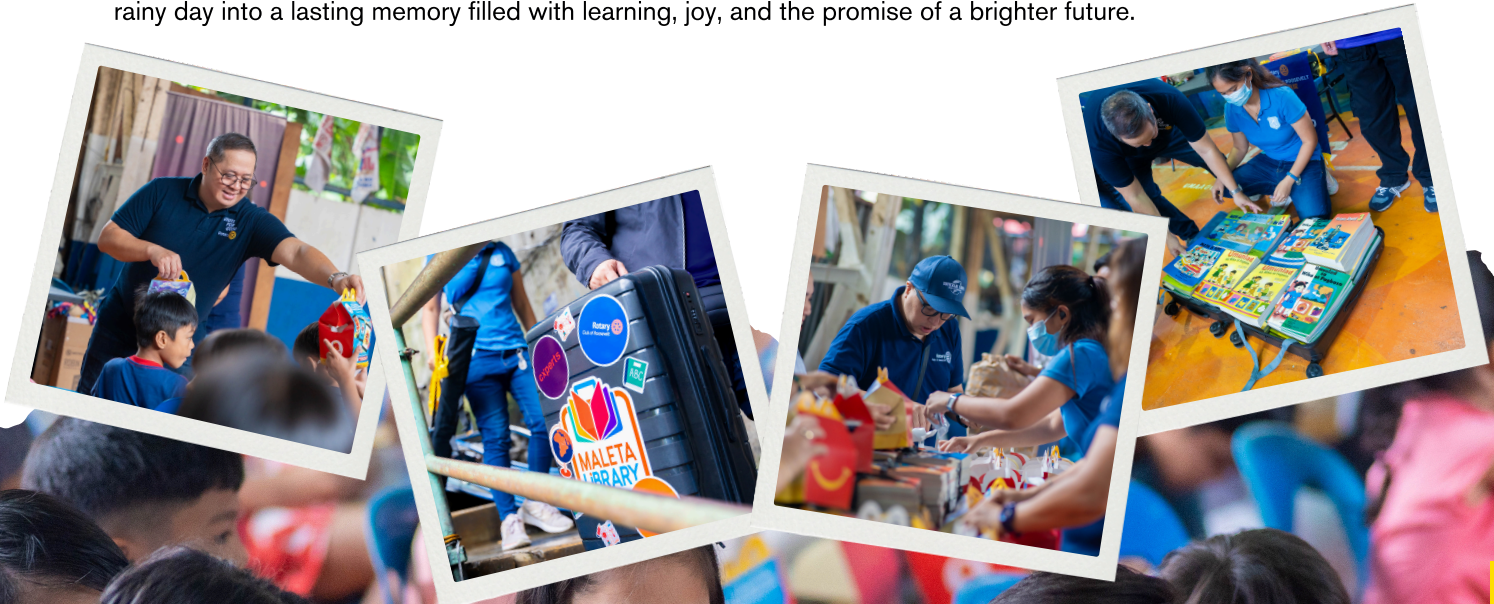

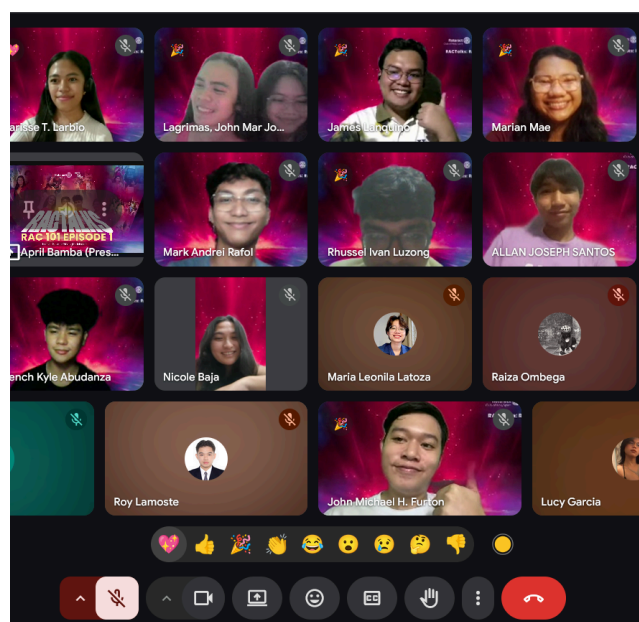
CONVERSATIONS THAT MATTER: ROTARACT HOLY SPIRIT'S JULY RACTALKS SERIES
